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- Keep track of voting records and hold officeholders accountable.
- Every American Christian who is eligible to vote does so either:
 - By default failing to vote
 - Carelessly voting without information and proper screening
 - Diligently by becoming informed about candidates' positions and values
- Become better informed about local and national political issues.
- Vote in every election including both primary and general elections.
- Participate actively in local politics including attending school board and other political meetings, etc.
- Participate in political conventions is another opportunity to get involved. Depending on the state, each major party has lower-level conventions that build up to the state conventions. First, there is a precinct convention, then a county or senatorial convention – a senatorial district convention is held when the county includes two or more state senate districts and then there is a state convention.
